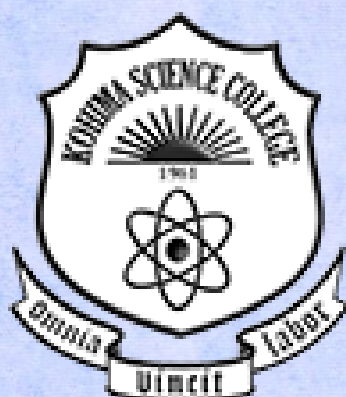

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision: To develop the college into a research driven education hub of national and international repute.

Mission: Kohima Science College, Jotsoma (KSCJ) started with the mission to encourage and impart science education in the year 1961. It is a premier college in the state of Nagaland, where science education occupies the central focus. With the changing time, the college has charted its own mission to respond to the emerging needs of the contemporary society by expanding its focal areas without losing its focus on science education as the central mission of the college. We are continuously striving to fulfil our mission in the following identified areas:

- a. To utilize academic autonomy to develop and maintain high academic standards in accordance with the national framework and changing academic and social benchmarks.
- b. To be an enabling agency for the students to develop their potentials to the fullest and become productive and responsible citizens of the contemporary society and the country.
- c. To promote and strengthen skill based courses in the curriculum.
- d. To promote student-centric technology enabled teaching and learning along with the core conventional methodology.
- e. To promote original and quality research with an emphasis on interdisciplinary approach.
- f. To encourage and support the faculty members to enhance their academic proficiency in accordance with the contemporary benchmark.
- g. To encourage a sense of teamwork and community service amongst the students and faculty members.
- h. To foster institutionalize innovative and best practices in the workplace by using transparent and decentralized working environment.

6.2 Does the Institution have a Management Information System

Yes. The college has an examination committee that looks after admission, attendance, continuous internal assessment, staff meeting notices, routines, exam duty rota, and the end semester examinations. Information is disseminated through SMSs thus cutting down on the use of paper.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) curriculum is taught at both the Undergraduate and Postgraduate level. The curriculum has been designed incorporating topics in relevance with the local context.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- a. Department of Chemistry will be offering PG courses from the academic session 2018-2019.
- b. Department of Computer Science will be introducing honours course from 2018 session.
- c. Department of Tenyidie (Vernacular) will be introducing Generic Elective course from 2018 session.
- d. Department of Computer Science will be starting one year course in Diploma in Computer Applications and Networking in collaboration with NEILIT, Kohima.
- e. The college has a plan to introduce the Massive Online Open Courses (MOOC) in the coming years in the curriculum.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) of student's performance is done through tests, assignments, project works, field works, attendance, seminars, end semester exam, etc. in both the UG and PG programs. For even semesters one examiner is appointed but for the odd semesters two different examiners are appointed for evaluation in order to test the uniformity of the evaluation. Answer scripts are not allowed to be marked or commented so as to maintain uniformity during evaluation. Appointment of external examiners for practical exams from May 2018 onwards.

- 1. Library smart card:** The library card serves as a membership card. A person who holds the card has borrowing or other privileges associated with the issuing library. The library card also serves as a method of identification.

7.3 Give two Best Practices of the institution (*please see the format in the NAAC Self-study Manuals*)

1. **Title of the Practice:** Supplementary Examination after publication of the results.
2. **Objective of the practice:**
 - i) To give opportunity to students who fail in the end semester exam and reappear for the same exam immediately.
 - ii) To help such students clear their arrears without wasting another year.
3. **The Context:** In the normal scheme of thing a student who fails a paper can take the exam in that paper only after one year in the corresponding semester examination. This not only results in the student losing a year or more but also piles on the stress of accumulated backlogs. Supplementary exam helps in solving this problem faced by the students. A crucial one year loss is averted.
4. **The practice:** Supplementary exams are conducted one month after the declaration of the end semester exam. A student who fails in the last exam can reappear those papers, in which he/ she has failed, in the supplementary exam. This is not an improve examination. A student can appear in any number of papers. However supplementary exam is offered only in the 5th and 6th semester in the case of undergraduate courses and 3rd and 4thSem for Post Graduate courses. The exam and declaration of the results are completed within two weeks after declaration of results of the regular end semester examination. The candidate needs to pay an additional semester fee to cover the extra cost incurred by the college and the gain of one year (opportunity cost). A candidate can appear supplementary exam 2 times after the main exam.
5. **Evidence of success:** This system allows students to catch with their peers and prevents the loss of a year or years. It also helps the student take the exam when the subject is still fresh in their minds. While some students may have failed in the first attempt because of laziness or sheer negligence, there are also student who fail owing to reasons beyond their control like illness, death in family or NCC/ NSS camps. In this system students can move on to the next semester without the strain of a backlog.
6. **Problems Encountered and Resources required:** This system adds additional strain on the examination branch. The Controller of Examination office has to find space and time to schedule the examination. Some students complain about high exam fees so it has to be told to them that they are saving a year. Additional stationary, man power for question setting, invigilation duty, examining and paper correction are some other problems.

1. **Title of the Practice:** Nagaland Innovation Expo
2. **Objective of the Practice:** The Nagaland Innovation Expo was conceptualized with an aim to identify and promote the innovative talent among the students within Nagaland. It can allow the students to present their originality, find ways to achieve greater refinement and share the products to utilize for greater benefit of the society.
3. **The Context:** The enormous creativity among the students which often go unnoticed because of the absence of a platform to demonstrate and harness it. There was a need to open an avenue to promote these innovative ideas and an opportunity to perform.
4. **The Practice:** The first NIE was held in Kohima Science College, Jotsoma on 14th April 2018. It was organized by the Students Union, KSCJ and sponsored by the Department of Science and Technology, Kohima, Nagaland and the Department of Higher Education, Nagaland. The chief guest at the event, Shri. Mhonlumo Kikon, Advisor for IT, Science & Technology and New & Renewable Energy, Government of Nagaland acknowledged the program and announced that the government would support the initiative and make it as an annual affair in Nagaland.

The program was a great success with turnout of participants from schools in Kohima and KSCJ. Eleven participants displayed and demonstrated their innovation models for competition which included concept models in the field of Agriculture, Chemical science, Environmental science, Life sciences, Mathematics and Physics.

Evidence of success: The model on “CV security” won the 1st first prize developed by Vikekho Yakhro and Chathavilie Peseyie, “Water absorbent tendency of moss for seed germination and agricultural techniques” by Zenwang Konyak won the 2nd prize and “Plant growth enhancer” by Peihauding Reunim won the 3rd prize. The event generated a sense of achievement for the participants and greater appreciation for the Students Union, KSCJ for taking the brave initiative to organize it, which in itself is an innovation.

- 5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** The continuation of the NIE as an annual event is an aspiration of the KSCJ Students Union and administration. There are certain loopholes that needed to be considered to make the NIE a common platform to attract greater participation and for continued success of the event. Although there was good number of participants, many colleges and schools within Nagaland could not participate because it coincided with only about a month ahead of the deadline. An appropriate timing and announcement of event date with minimum of five to six months duration for preparation could provide greater opportunity for participation and wider coverage in the future.
